

Acacia littorea

No common name

Vascular Plant Family: Fabaceae

Flowers late winter and spring

Acacia littorea is a dense, prickly, much branched shrub to 2m. The branches are prominently ribbed. This species has been planted at the Wave Walk car park. It is recorded south from Busselton.



The phyllodes are triangular about 17mm long and 15mm wide, with the midrib closer to the base.



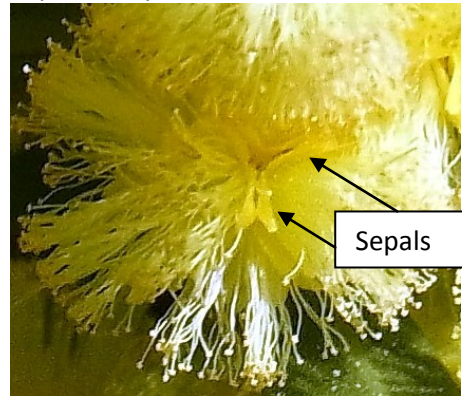
Gland

The margin that lies parallel to the small branch has a gland at its end.

The flowering heads are round, pale yellow up to 7mm across. They are solitary in the axil of a phyllode.



The heads have up to 15 flowers. Each flower has 4 sepals and petals.



Sepals

The pods are curved, up to 60mm long with thickened margins. With age they become dark-brown to black.
