Jacksonia horrida

Commonly: No common name Vascular Plant Family: Fabaceae

Flowers spring and summer

Jacksonia horrida is a dense, prickly shrub to 2m tall. It has no true leaves but branchlets which take on the leaf function.



The branchlets are strongly angular to winged, divided into 2 or 3 linear segments which have a prominent midrib and are spine tipped.



The inflorescence is of scattered or clusters flowers.



The calyx can be up to 10mm long with the lobes strongly reflexed in flower. The outer surface is covered with minute hairs.



The flowers are yellow and orange to red and brown with stalks about 5mm long. The standard petal is slightly shorter than the calyx lobes.
